# Argyle Free Library Strategic Plan 2025-2030

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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

The world is changing rapidly, and the Argyle Free Library is committed to evolving alongside it. To stay relevant and continue serving our community effectively, we have developed a Five-Year Strategic Plan. This plan will guide decisions about programming, material selection, new services, and more.

The introduction outlines the methods we used to gather input for the plan.

Next, we offer a brief history of the Argyle Free Library, highlighting the dedication of past residents who, often with limited resources, worked tirelessly to create and sustain a library for the community.

We also present local demographic data to illustrate the diverse groups we serve.

Finally, the Mission, Vision, and Value Statements are included to show how they align with and inform the direction of this Strategic Plan.

The heart of the Strategic Plan is the four goals for the library, which library stakeholders have targeted as priorities to focus on throughout the next five years. Each goal is supported by action steps, timelines, and measurements of success. These goals have been chosen to help the library work as a community hub and resource, as well as to support life-long learning.

- · Goal One is to invest in Staff Development and Support
- · Goal Two is to Obtain Sustainable Funding
- · Goal Three is to Create New Space and Update Infrastructure
- · Goal Four is to Meet Argyle's 21st Century Technology Needs

By adopting this plan, the Board of the Argyle Free Library is committing to follow this plan. A new plan will be written in five years which will build off the successes and failures of the plan presented here.

#### PLANNING SUMMARY

A Strategic Planning Committee was formed consisting of the Library Director and three members of the Board of Trustees. The committee began by creating a community survey to identify the current and future needs and desires of library patrons, community stakeholders, and other interested parties.

Once the survey responses were collected, the committee met to analyze the results and identify goals for the next five years that will allow the library to meet the growing needs of the community. As the committee began to flesh out the goals, a meeting with Erica Freudenberger of Southern Adirondack Library System (SALS) was held. The discussion and work session with Erica helped the committee to solidify and expand the identified goals into a workable format. Two more committee meetings were held to populate the template, which was then presented to the Board members and library staff for their input. Upon completion, the Strategic Plan was made available to the public on the library's website.

#### HISTORY OF ARGYLE FREE LIBRARY

The story of the Argyle Free Library begins in the early 19th century, rooted in a shared love of reading among the village and town residents. In 1805, the first effort to create a public library took shape with plans to house it in the home and tavern of Pelag Bragg, located at the corner of Main and Sheridan Streets, now the site of Stewart's. By 1823, the Argyle Social Library was incorporated and operated out of Joseph Rouse's inn, once located where the former IGA store and parking lot now sit.

As the town grew, informal reading circles became popular, with books being kept in private homes like that of Dr. Stillman on East Street. By 1920, the Village Improvement Association helped transform these grassroots efforts into a formal library.

The East Street office of the late Dr. Stillman became the first home of the Argyle Free Library. The provisional charter issued at that time became a permanent charter in 1974.

In 1927, sisters Cora Breason Mott and Anna Breason Gilchrist donated the current library building, one of the oldest in the village. The library continued to grow with community support. In the 1950s, a TV appearance by Mrs. Ralph McGeoch on Queen for a Day brought attention and improvements, and the library joined the Southern Adirondack Library System (SALS) in 1958.

By the 1990s, it was clear that more space was needed at the library. Construction on the new wing started in 1994 and was finished in 1995. The dedication of this new wing was held on June 11, 1995.

Over the decades, the library has transformed from a single-room space with a wood stove and kerosene lamp to a fully modern facility with children's programs, public computers, and access to thousands of digital resources.

During the COVID-19 pandemic, the Argyle Free Library responded swiftly, offering virtual programs, curbside pickup, and public Wi-Fi at the Cossayuna Fire House to serve those without internet access. Since then, the library has continued to evolve, with updated furnishings, expanded programming, and a stronger digital presence. Today's libraries are more than book repositories, they are dynamic community hubs offering internet access, learning opportunities, and makerspaces. To meet the changing needs of the 21st century, the Argyle Free Library is once again planning to grow. The library's foundation is its history of service; its future depends on you.
